Now you are ready to type in the necessary bibliographic information.

If you are citing a book for example, follow the prompts to type the author's last name, author's first name, book title, city where the book was published, the publisher, and the copyright year.

NOTE: the citation generators are **case sensitive**.

Once you've typed in all bibliographic information, click the **Save Citation** button.

Repeat as necessary for all your sources.
